

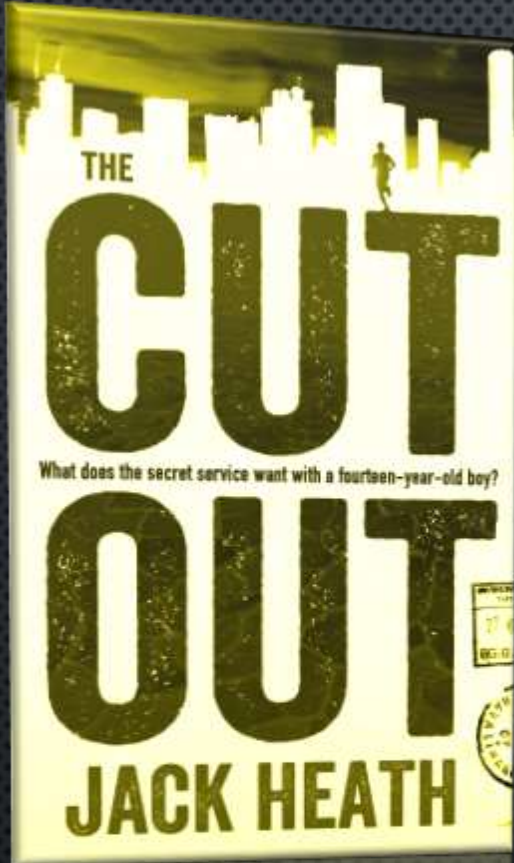

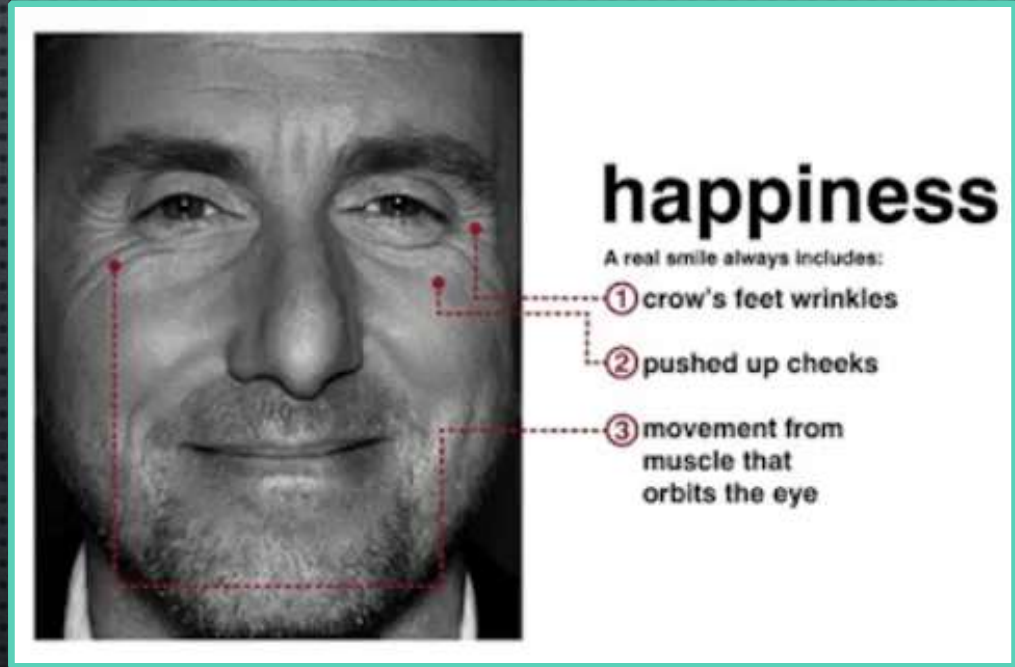

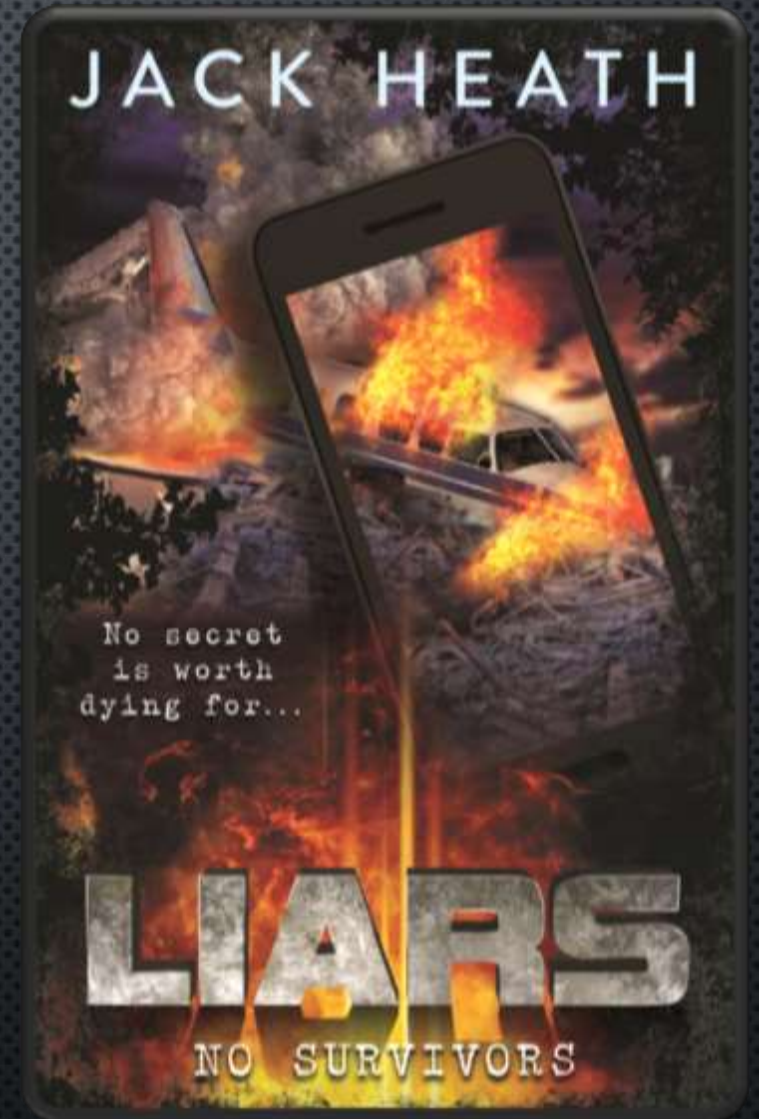
SIGNS THAT A STORY IS TRUE

1. TOLD OUT OF ORDER
2. HAS DIALOGUE (NOT JUST SUMMARIES)
3. FULL OF SENSORY DETAIL
4. REVEALS THE NARRATOR'S FLAWS
5. INCLUDES SURPRISES
6. DESCRIBES EMOTIONS
7. HAS INFORMATION ONLY PROFESSIONALS WOULD KNOW

HOW TO WRITE A GREAT STORY

1. TELL IT OUT OF ORDER
2. USE DIALOGUE (NOT JUST SUMMARIES)
3. ADD SENSORY DETAIL
4. REVEAL THE NARRATOR'S FLAWS
5. INCLUDE SURPRISES
6. DESCRIBE EMOTIONS
7. RESEARCH THINGS ONLY PROFESSIONALS WOULD KNOW
